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Director's Message

I am pleased to present the summarized profile of ATC, the United Nations funded first humanitarian demining Non-Government Organization (NGO) in the world, this document outlines the long journey of ATC from early 1989 which UN requested me appointment for a meeting to the 31 December 2025.

Over the past 37 years, ATC has reached all corners of Afghanistan, removing 4.1 million anti-personnel and anti-vehicle mines and explosive ordnance from 433.4 million square meters of high-priority land. Also, ATC has delivered risk education to 807,000 vulnerable individuals; girls, boys, women, and men.

Millions of people, mostly civilians, now use the lands cleared by ATC. Once densely mined and posing a deadly threat, these areas have transformed back into universities, hospitals, schools, airports, highways, recreational sites, agricultural and grazing lands, and residential areas. I am proud to highlight some significant sites cleared by ATC: Kabul University, Kabul International Airport, Bamyan historical sites (Shahre Ghulghula, Shahre Zohak, Buddha Statues), the Kabul-Kandahar Highway, the Kabul-Hayratan Powerline, Jalalabad Airport, the Kabul New City Water Supply Project, Kandahar Airport, Baghe Zakira in Taloqan, and many more.

ATC could not have achieved these milestones without the generous assistance of the UN officials, diplomats, international and national friends of ATC, journalists, community members, and the honest and loyal staff of ATC who joined me deliver this vital service successfully and make this country a safer place to live.

I would like to express my appreciation and gratitude thanks to the donor communities either bilateral or through international organizations like the UN, and the EU, for their tremendous support in the last many years, which their assistance brought the program from zero in 1989 to the highest level.

Hereby, I request the donor community for their further assistance to Afghanistan.

Afghan Technical Consultants (ATC)

Prior to the establishment of ATC

According to the book named (Blinded by Humanity), on pages 84 to 91, prior to the establishment of ATC there was no organization to have successful humanitarian demining operation in any country of the world.

Moreover, for justifying that ATC is the first demining Organization in the world, I bring here comments of Mr. Barber in his book (Blinded by Humanity) in page 87: “We invited prominent Afghans in Peshawar to nominate possible candidates. The first to be identified was Kefayatullah Eblagh”. This shows that I -Kefayatullah Eblagh- was the first who made the humanitarian demining operations successful for the first time in the world, the other organizations mentioned in the same page could not. For more details, please see the above-mentioned book.

In 1989, when the first stages of setting up a mine action program for Afghanistan were put into place, military trainers from many nations set up training grounds near Peshawar, Pakistan, and trained the first few thousand deminers in what became known as “Operation Salam”.

- The initial concept was to train Afghans, to work as unpaid volunteers to de-mine areas around their own villages.
- Three thousand Afghan volunteers were trained, and received pay for their training, but the whole scheme fell flat on its face when the “volunteer de-miners” were sent back to their villages. The idea of doing a dangerous job like de-mining with no real medical or organization back up, little in the way of equipment, no salary and no insurance cover soon lost its appeal.
- Mr. Martin Barber, Chief of Mission, UNOCHA in early 1989 requested the Minister of Reconstruction, Afghanistan Interim Government in exile to introduce an English-trained senior official who could make this demining program successful, after two days while working as chief of staff at the Military Academy and the head of Signals in the HQ of Mujahidin I was introduced by the Deputy Minister of Reconstruction to UNOCHA field officer in Peshawar.
- Mr. Micheal Keating field officer of UNOCHA requested me through the Deputy Minister of Reconstruction an appointment. In that meeting he discussed all unsuccessful attempts for starting demining program in Afghanistan and gave me the guideline for preparing and submitting a proposal to the UN.
- I said “the way the UN proceeded was completely wrong, and that if the UN wanted me to manage this program in the best possible way to be successful, I want the UN to address three points I mentioned (salary, pension and insurance coverage for deminers, and demining equipment) and the fourth one I assure which is monitoring of my demining operations in the field by any UN officials.”
- The first meeting was in early 1989, and the proposal I submitted for three million dollars was rejected by the UN because of non-availability of funds.
- After two months, the UN requested me to submit another proposal of 50,000 dollar, I responded that, as far as my proposal was not accepted, then the UN could prepare an acceptable proposal

for them. Then, the UN staff in UNOCHA developed a proposal for 150,000 dollar and got approval from the UN, but because of some weaknesses I rejected that version.

- To summarize, it took seven months of negotiations between me and the UN that finally I agreed, with some conditions, and made a second contract beside the main UN contract to implement the 240,000 dollars' worth Pilot Project, at the result of which ATC was established.”

ATC

The first Operationally Successful Humanitarian Demining NGO in the Globe

Afghan Technical Consultants (ATC) establishment took so long, because of non-availability of fund and threats remain from presence of mines and the accidents in mine-affected countries; Afghanistan was the worst affected one in the world. Finally, after several months of positive negotiations, I - on behalf of ATC and Mr. Martin Barber on behalf of the UN signed the contract with an amendment for implementing a six-month Pilot Project on 28 October 1989 which valued at US\$ 240,000.

- After establishment of ATC, I remained among five advisers from different nationalities with different ideas. Some of them tried to make me fail. You can imagine how hard was for me to manage the situation to the benefit of ATC, with a lot of contradictory advices I was able to make difficult decisions and run the operations on the ground with high morale and discipline. Within three months, on 21 January 1990 I handed over to the community the cleared 1.7 km road.
- I started work in Kunar province and soon I led the ATC teams to 5 provinces of Paktika, Ghazni, Bamyan and Badakhshan provinces and employed 1,000 people till end of 1990. My successes in the provinces attract attention of donors and the United Nations who had rejected my first proposal of three million dollars, provided me six million dollars by the end of year 1990.
- Over the last 35 years, ATC has covered 32 out of 34 provinces in Afghanistan and enjoy significant support of communities in all levels.
- At the end, I am thankful to all the nations worldwide for their supports once they realized I am purely impartial, and want to serve the communities in need.

Participation of ATC in Global Demining

Quality Assurance of UNOPS-Contracted Demining Operations in Northern Iraq:

In 1999, ATC was awarded the Quality Assurance Contract in Northern Iraq by the United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS) through a competitive bidding process, in order to carry out the monitoring and inspections of demining organizations under contract with UNOPS. This included monitoring of integrated manual demining, mine detection dogs, mechanical demining and EOD operations, as well as sampling activities of cleared land to ensure that the required clearance standards have been met. Owing to visa problems with the Iraqi authorities, the project had to be put off.

ATC Technical Experts in Iraq: Although ATC personnel had not carried out any survey operations specifically in ATC, but the type of activity they implemented required to have knowledge about survey. By offering this task of survey, they showed their talent and success in this field as well. From Nov. 1998 till late 2000, three ATC personnel were busy supervising survey operations in Northern Iraq.

Somali Land: Since commencement of demining activities in Somali Land, three ATC personnel left for Somali Land in June 1999. The demining program there, contracted between GFC and the United Nations, was successfully carried on and given tasks were cleared. Upon completion of the target, the personnel returned to ATC.

After it has been proved that ATC personnel are of an outstanding talent and are very efficient in their tasks, international demining agencies started to use the professionalism and expertise of ATC staff in their programs.

Currently, ATC has been registered in the Republic of South Sudan as a demining company and has submitted three proposals in response to the RFPs released by the UNOPS. Although the projects were not awarded to ATC, it was a new experience for the organization to bid in the UN global marketplace.

Likewise, ATC is registered as a demining entity in Khartoum, Republic of Sudan and submitted a proposal there but the fund was not available and the RFP was cancelled by the UNOPS.

ATC plans to continue its efforts to find new opportunities in other countries and use its expertise outside Afghanistan.

Today: ATC is ready in providing staff to carry out, supervise and implement different pillars of mine action projects in mine-affected parts of the globe.

ATC has always exploited the successful expertise of its staff in better operations, managerial and technical fields to give its donors and clients satisfaction for its efficient work and effective management.

ATC Mine Action Techniques and Activities

The variations in mine type, terrain and military application produces a complex combination of challenges. Challenges that generate the need for a “Tool Bag” approach to the clearance problem. No one solution will meet the needs of every situation.

11. Using Mine Detection Dogs for verification of cleared lands

Capacity Building Sessions Designed and Delivered by ATC Training Cell

ATC, beside running survey and demining in the field, was not failed to employ international experts for BAC, EOD, and Mechanical demining training for the staff of demining and running the operation of those. Some of the trainings are mentioned here.

ATC Recently-Completed Projects

Recently, ATC completed two mine action projects in Afghanistan, both supervised by a young, educated and trained staff of ATC. The results were very commendable. He received many appreciation letters from the officials of government for his high-standard operations. While I cannot present all these letters here, they will be available in ATC's archive. Now, he is under my training to prepare him to respond to questions from donors, government authorities, as well as the community and staff on my behalf, and I can be confident of ATC, then, I continue my work to help the global community through Mine Action services and facilitate opportunities for other Afghan demining experts. Financial Spot Check of the Project:

In late July 2025, a week after the completion of the project the Humanitarian Finance Unit (HFU) of OCHA conducted a Financial Spot Check of the project documentation. During the short visit, the spot checker raised a number of points that required lots of work. Therefore, ATC maintained some essential staff in the finance section to address the points and get ready for the project audit. The process is on-going and I hope the audit goes well.

ATC Availability for Implementing Projects in Afghanistan

1. ATC has experienced, trained, and educated personnel for implementation of any project of any mine action techniques in Afghanistan.
2. ATC has kept pools of donors' equipment enabling it to implement demining project smoothly and successfully.
3. ATC gives priority to implantation of mine action projects in Afghanistan with high quality of job and with the satisfaction of bilateral and international donors.
4. ATC, since 2020, has started to train educated and young generation for taking over the responsibility of running the organization's lower and middle management levels in the highly qualified manner.
5. The successful operational activity of ATC in the recent projects of US DOS more than 3-million-dollar project and of OCHA about 500,000-dollar project are reflected in our documents in visits of the donor and the UN as well as the communities and the stakeholders' letters and emails received by ATC which show that ATC is a highly qualified organization for implementing the projects operationally successful and responsive to the communities. If anyone interested in knowing about this, ATC is ready to present the proof of successful implementing of the projects in more detailed.
6. The vehicles ATC has available despite that their life already finished, instead of renting new vehicles and wasting donors' money we can make ATC road-worthy vehicles ready for the implementation of the project.
7. In the last, ATC proposes to any donor who wants to provide fund to ATC to please provide us opportunity to get training or understand the policies and requirements of the donor for documentation and developing financial reports for that specific donor in order to avoid any dispute and misunderstanding of the donor policy for implementing financial issues. This has been the policy of ATC for the last 36 years.

8. For better understanding of ATC, it should be mentioned that in the past ATC was able to win the contract for QA of all mine action organizations working in Northern Iraq funded by the UN. It showed that ATC is developed at international level for implementing the projects in any country. ATC requirement is to implement its own standard procedures and policies in the target country making sure the project's success.

Summary of Profile

In summary of this profile, I reach to the following points in regard of ATC, in Afghanistan:

- 1- ATC is the first successful Mine Action Organization started with very limited fund of the United Nations after seven months tireless negotiations, taking firm decisions after hearing contradictory advices from 5 advisers, and releasing threats of threatened deminers, and so on.
- 2- After our successful operations, other organizations followed steps of ATC worldwide which you can see the comments of the officials of UN and assigning of one of ATC international supervisors Mr. Andre Mollaret to Mozambique and requesting of me to go as UN program manager to Angola, which I rejected.
- 3- ATC director general is politically impartial and always closely supervises the organization in any part of the world he is and tries to make governments understand the problem of mine action, for this I appreciate the willingness of DMAC, for assistance.
- 4- ATC is always ready for any training to understand the policy of donors and prepare financial reports according to their requirements.
- 5- ATC is ready to accept any project to be in line of complete impartiality and transparency.

As the time was limited I think this is enough, however, I am trying to do further development to ATC.
